SYNOPSIS

LET ME DANCE is a non-narrative aesthetic short film, filmed in the style of a music video that presents the issue of misogyny and ordinary sexism through the dances of shackled women, accompanied by excerpts from the declaration of human rights read by Eleanor Roosevelt in 1948. Directed by Laure Gervais and produced by SisterArt non-profit organisation.

SisterArt deals with the cold violence to which women are subjected in their daily lives through six portraits. They improvise a dance constrained by a gesture that symbolizes the emotional shackles they feel. Cold violence is existential suffering, more or less great, little or not visible but felt on a daily basis and which contains a sexist character.

DIRECTOR & BIOGRAPHY

Passionate about theater and cinema, Laure Gervais makes experimental videos and short films as part of her multidisciplinary artistic activities. She has directed and co-directed numerous institutional films, some of which have been noticed at the Green Award, the international responsible film festival in Deauville. LET ME DANCE is his first arthouse short film.

Born in Paris in 1972, Laure Gervais studied Human Sciences alongside a multidisciplinary artistic career. Her artistic quest is driven by a number of experiments, developed through different techniques that she does not hesitate to mix: painting, screen printing, photography, video, performance. Co-founder of the non-profit association SisterArt, she is also the author of artistic chronicles and plays.

PRODUCTION

SisterArt is a collective of multidisciplinary artists founded in 2009 by visual artist Laure Gervais and actress and dramatic Art teacher, Catherine Nowak. The collective aims at combining its passion for visual arts and performing arts.

SisterArt creates and produces within those two areas, in a surrealistic baroque genre. With their creations, SisterArt express itself mainly, not only, around feminine subjects. The main goal of the association is to reveal alienations and behavioral conditionings.

From experimental videos to art house short movies, from scenography to multimedia installations, SisterArt write drama plays and compose sound artworks. Finally, SisterArt collective is also publisher of artistic chronicles aiming at awakening critical thinking and initiating to contemporary art.
